William P Hobby Airport is an international airport located seven miles southeast of downtown Houston, Texas. It serves as a major hub for Southwest Airlines and offers flights to numerous destinations within the US and internationally. The airport features a single terminal with two concourses, one dedicated to domestic flights and the other to international arrivals. Passengers can explore various dining options, including cafes, fast food, takeaway, sit-down restaurants, kid-friendly menus, and vegetarian options. Additionally, there are numerous retail shops offering a range of products from convenience stores to electronics, souvenirs, and duty-free goods. Transportation options include taxi stands outside the arrivals level, public buses (METRO Bus 40), rental cars available at the baggage claim area, and limousine services requiring badge verification. A free shuttle bus connects the terminal to the rental car facility centre. Parking facilities operate on a first-come, first-served basis, with options for valet parking and priority access. Major airlines operating at Hobby Airport include Southwest Airlines, Allegiant Air, Delta, Sun Country Airlines, Xtra Airways, American Airlines, Frontier Airlines, and Latitude. The airport's map can be accessed online to plan travel routes and locate gates, terminals, and amenities. Houston Intercontinental Airport (IAH) offers non-stop domestic and international service with 185 routes, making it a major hub in the US. The airport is ranked 15th globally for passenger traffic and has over 11,000 acres of land. It features five terminals labeled A through E, connected by two transportation systems: the Skyway for post-security transfers and the Subway for pre-security movement. Each terminal caters to specific airlines and functions. Terminal A handles non-United domestic flights with 20 gates, while Terminal B is dedicated to United Express flights with 40 gates. Terminal C serves United's domestic flights with 29 gates, followed by Terminal D for non-United international flights with 12 gates, and finally Terminal E managing United's international flights with 24 gates. To navigate the airport efficiently, familiarize yourself with your terminal in advance. The interactive map allows you to pan, zoom, and search for specific amenities or locations within the terminals. You can also use the Skyway system for swift transfers between terminals after security. With this guide, you'll be able to make the most of your journey at Houston Intercontinental Airport. Whether you're looking to expedite your security process or renew your TSA PreCheck membership, this guide has you covered. George Bush Airport has security checkpoints in each of its five terminals. Arrive at least two hours before your flight to allow enough time for security screening. The security checkpoints are equipped with advanced technology to ensure safety and security. Remove shoes, belts, and jackets, place electronic devices and liquids in a separate bin, and be prepared for screening. Fast Track lanes are available for passengers with TSA PreCheck or Global Entry status. These lanes are located in each terminal and offer shorter wait times and less stringent screening procedures. Apply online or at the airport to join these programs. Passport and immigration control is located in Terminal E of IAH. Arriving international passengers must go through passport control, where their passports will be checked and stamped by a U.S. Customs and Border Protection officer. Afterward, collect luggage from baggage claim, proceed to customs inspection, and declare any items brought into the country if necessary. TSA and TSA Pre Checkpoints are located throughout IAH airport, ensuring safety and security for all passengers. TSA PreCheck allows eligible passengers to move through security checkpoints more quickly with less hassle. To get TSA Pre Check, you gotta apply and get approved through the program first. Once you're in, you can zip through designated lanes at IAH and other cool airports. If you wanna know how long the lines are, check this real-time wait times page. Houston's IAH Airport is one of many US airports with Global Entry enrollment. This program lets low-risk travelers skip some lines when they arrive in the States. To join, fill out an online app and schedule a meet at a Global Entry spot. IAH has one in Terminal E near Gate E12. Once you're all set, you can use special kiosks to breeze through customs. Also at IAH, there are CLEAR Plus lanes where you can speed through security checks. If you wanna know more about CLEAR and airport ops, check the TSA Wait Times page for details. Right now, you can get CLEAR for two months free in partnership with iFly! To renew or join TSA PreCheck, head to this exclusive offer on the iFly site. TSA Pre is only for US citizens, nationals, and lawful permanent residents. IAH has five terminals - A to E - each with its own food, shops, and amenities like spas and nap rooms. You can even grab free Wi-Fi or a shower if you need one! If you're wondering where to find good eats or fun shopping spots, check out the restaurants and shops guide for Terminal A to D, as well as Terminal E has some more options too! Located on the lower floor of each terminal, baggage claim areas can be accessed via signs guiding passengers to their respective carousels. With five terminals in total, each having its own baggage claim area, travelers can easily find their belongings. To make transporting luggage more convenient, carts are available for free use at these areas. To navigate between terminals, the Skyway above ground and Subway underground provide easy connections after and before security checks respectively. For those looking to move between airports, George Bush Intercontinental Airport (IAH) is situated approximately 23 miles north of Downtown Houston, serving as a major hub for international travel. Terminal A handles non-United domestic flights, Terminal B serves United Express, Terminal C hosts United's domestic flights, Terminal D serves non-United international flights, and Terminal E handles United international flights. Security checkpoints are strategically located within each terminal, with some featuring Fast Track lanes for TSA PreCheck or Global Entry. For those traveling internationally via Terminal E, passport and immigration control occur after security screening. Transportation options at IAH include the Subway before security and the Skyway afterward, along with taxis, rideshares, rental cars, and airport parking available for use. Hobby Airport (HOU), which is about 7 miles away from the city center. United Airlines operates the most flights out of Houston airports, with George Bush Intercontinental Airport (IAH) and Hobby Airport being its main hubs. If you're flying within the US, or prefer a quick connection to Downtown, choose Hobby Airport, while IAH is recommended for international flights, offering more airline choices and convenience near North Houston. The distance between IAH and HOU airports is approximately 42 miles by car.
